A wonderful start to the evening will find us at the Museum of Fine Arts, across the Plaza from the hotel. Housed in a spectacular Pueblo Revival building, the Museum's exhibits will include "Georgia O'Keeffe's Legacy in New Mexico" and "Gustave Baumann: A Santa Fe Legend." Heavy hors d'oeuvres will be served. *Please Note: This portion of the evening is not appropriate for young children.* We will return to LaFonda for dessert and "Graduations and Transitions" – a special event to recognize the achievements of students, residents, and our colleagues. Mingle with friends old and new as we close out another WIM experience! *Cost included in registration fee.*

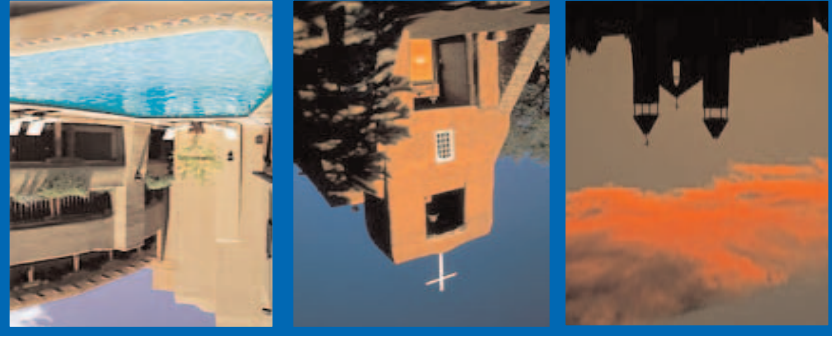
Accommodations

This year, we will meet at the "End of the Santa Fe Trail" – LaFonda on the Plaza. This vibrant, historic landmark situated on the southeast corner of the downtown plaza is known for its pueblo-style Spanish architecture and decor. Visitors will marvel at the hand-carved beams and corbels, latilla ceilings and an eclectic collection of paintings, pottery and other original works created by local artisans.

A block of colorful and unique rooms (each featuring hand-painted furniture) has been reserved for WIM conference registrants at LaFonda. Reservations may be made by calling the hotel directly at 800-253-5002 or 505-982-5511. A limited number of rooms are available at the group rate on May 11, 12 and 13, as well as May 18, 2006. Transportation and Travel

Major airlines serve Santa Fe via Albuquerque, 60 miles away. Transportation from Albuquerque to Santa Fe is available. Information will be sent to you upon registration.

Weather

The forecast for Santa Fe in May is sun, followed by more sun! At an elevation of 7,000 feet, the average daily temperature is 72 with lows in the evening around 40. Generally, light to medium weight clothing is recommended – always bring along a sweater or light jacket for evenings.

Area Information/Leisure Time

Amenities at La Fonda include a new fitness center, massage services, outdoor hot tub, and heated outdoor pool. La Fonda stands at the southeastern corner of the Santa Fe Plaza - in the heart of town.

Santa Fe, often called the City Different, is a town of many attractions. The eight block radius of the Plaza offers easy access to charming Spanish style architecture, excellent shopping, exquisite cuisine and world class art galleries and museums, including the famed Georgia O'Keeffe Gallery and Museum and the Museum of Fine Arts. Nearby "Museum Hill" features the Museum of International Folk Art and the Museum of Indian Arts & Culture as well as the Laboratory of Anthropology.

A top cultural destination, Santa Fe is home to a wealth of historically significant venues. The Palace of the Governors is the oldest continuously occupied public building in the United States, housing Spanish, Pueblo, Indian, Mexican Confederate and United States governments during its nearly 400-year history. Loreto Chapel features the miraculous (double helix) staircase built by a mysterious carpenter, believed by Loreto nuns to be St. Joseph.

Don't limit your stay to the Plaza, however. Hiking and biking trails for all levels of abilities are within a ten to fifteen minute drive. And, of course, exploring the rich history of the Pueblo people cannot be forgotten. The dry climate of this area has been ideal for preserving ancient pueblos, cliff dwellings and ancient artifacts, all within an hour's drive of Santa Fe. You will come to understand why New Mexico is known as "The Land of Enchantment."



A Women's Health Symposium

Women in Medicine 2006 will be the 23rd annual retreat and CME conference for lesbian physicians, medical students, and their partners. This gathering is a blend of education, camaraderie, networking, and mentoring. The program format includes general sessions and breakouts incorporating up-to-date information on women's health issues, lesbian health research, and other pertinent medical topics. Breakout sessions for non-physician partners will also be conducted. New This Year!

Qigong - Similar to Tai Chi, but less structured, start your morning with the gentle movements and quieting of the mind that is the "moving meditation" of Qigong.

Book Club - On Monday evening, join in a discussion of the 1927 Willa Cather novel, "Death Comes for the Archbishop." This classic reveals the customs and beliefs of the Mexican and Indian populations in 1851 New Mexico.
